US\$200 MILLION CHALLENGE

As of 10 June 2010, Rotarians have raised approximately US\$129.5 million for the US\$200 Million Challenge. These contributions will help Rotary raise US\$200 million to match US\$355 million in challenge grants received from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Fundraising Round-up

Walking Stick Fundraiser:

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) acquired 19 walking sticks. Each one is uniquely painted with the underside engraved with: "No Crutches, No Canes. A World Without Polio. Thanks, Rotary International."

The sticks were originally used as mementos to people who were recognized as Polio Champions, in thanks for their support of Rotary International and the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. There were remaining sticks that The Rotary Foundation offered to be used for fundraising efforts, and that's how one of the Rotary walking sticks began its amazing odyssey.

Harriet Schloer, District 5110's PolioPlus chair offered one of the sticks to the Rotary Club of Jefferson County (Madras, OR) for its annual Cherry Tree auction on February 20, 2010. District Governor John Cox (D5110) won the stick with a bid of US\$700 and took it to his home in Eugene, OR.

In March 2010, DG Cox was invited to attend the Rotary Club of Fisherman's Wharf's (D5150) crab feed fundraiser. DG John offered the Rotary walking stick as an auction item, with the stipulation that it would go for not a penny less than US\$500. Cox made the pitch, served as auctioneer, and within a few minutes sold the stick to Rotarian Lee Page for US\$1,200.

In two short months, this one walking stick has raised US\$8,100 toward Polio eradication and has the potential to raise even more – quite a journey for what began as a decorative stick of wood to help one person walk. It now promises to help hundreds.

Kick Polio Out of Africa

In anticipation of the FIFA World Cup, Rotary clubs across Africa geared up for the final push to eradicate polio on the continent. The Kick Polio Out of Africa campaign launched 23 February with the symbolic kicking of a soccer ball signed by Nobel Peace Prize laureate Desmond Tutu, a polio survivor. Primary sponsor of the campaign is DHL Express. En route to the RI Convention in Montréal, Québec, Canada, the ball's journey began in Cape Town, South Africa (one of the host cities for the 2010 World Cup) and continued through 22 countries, most of them polio-affected. During the ball's four-month trip, Rotary clubs in polio-affected countries organized soccer-related polio awareness events to generate support for polio immunization. Each national PolioPlus committee chair also signed the ball. People were able to follow the ball's journey on the Kick Polio Out of Africa blog. Indian Celebrity Joins “This Close” PSA Campaign

Amitabh Bachchan, an iconic figure who first gained popularity as an Indian film star in the 1970s, has agreed to join the ranks of celebrities and notables participating in the “This Close” Public Service Announcement (PSA) Campaign for polio eradication. Mr. Bachchan did the shoot for the advertisement in late May and a TV version of the campaign is now in development.

Christine McNab from the Gates Foundation traveled to Kano, a city at the epicenter of the battle against polio in Nigeria. During her visit, she met Umar Aminu, a boy who has been infected with the polio virus. FUND DEVELOPMENT

Contributions Update

Total contributions to The Rotary Foundation through 31 May 2010 are 11.98 % above last year's figures for the same period due in large measure to contributions to Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge. Of that amount, US\$80,388,705 represents contributions to the Annual Programs Fund, a decline of 0.21 % over last year. Permanent Fund contributions at US\$9,446,711 are up 14.33%. PolioPlus contributions totaled US\$32,213,429. Restricted giving is up 20.79 % to US\$18,440,288. Unrestricted Other representing contributions to the Donor Advised Fund are up 61.04% at US\$3,381,189 in support of Haitian disaster recovery efforts.

Final APF Countdown –Year-End Call to Action to Reach US\$96,000,000

To achieve our US\$96,000,000 Annual Programs Fund Goal by 30 June 2010, please monitor your *RRFC Fundraising Progress Reports* and the Non-Contributing Club Reports for your zone. Work with your zone team to call the DGs, DRFCs, AGSCs and Polio Coordinators to encourage them to contact all the clubs in their districts to send in contributions early so the cutoffs are not missed. It's good to remind all club presidents, club Foundation chairs and club treasurers that contributions to Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge **do not count** toward their Annual Programs Fund Goals. As of 16 June 2010, a total of 10,322 clubs have not yet contributed to the Foundation.

Deadlines: Contribution Processing Cutoff Dates for 2009-10 Rotary Year

Noted below are the 30 June 2010 cutoff dates and times for gifts to be credited in this fiscal year:

- For contributions to be counted in this Rotary year, they must be postmarked by 30 June 2010 and received at the bank lockbox by Wednesday, 7 July 2010.
- Checks at World Headquarters: must be postmarked 30 June 2010 or prior and received at the Accounts Receivable (AR) department by 1500 hours, Tuesday, 6 July 2010.
- Wire transfers: Must be initiated prior to 30 June 2010 and received at the bank by 3 July 2010.
- Credit Card Contributions:
 - **online via www.rotary.org** -- must be authorized prior to 2400 hours 30 June 2010, **CDT**. (*Gifts received via the web will only benefit the Rotarian who logged in. Reclass and redistribution (corrections) requests cannot be accepted for these gifts.*)
 - **via fax to 1-847-556-2139; phone to 1-866-976-8279 (US and Canada only); or mail** to World Headquarters in Evanston - must be received by the AR Department and authorized by the close of business at 1700 hours on 30 June 2010.
 - **via the bank lockbox** – must be postmarked by 30 June 2010 and received at the lockbox by Wednesday, 7 July 2010. (*NOTE: to ensure timely recording credit card contributions should not be sent to the lockbox*)
- Reclasses/Redistributions: requests must be received prior to 1500 hours, Tuesday, 6 July 2010 to: trfcorrections@rotary.org
- International Offices and Fiscal Agents have until 13 July 2010 to report June 2010 contributions to the AR Department.
- Any contributions postmarked after 30 June 2010 or received after the cutoff dates stated above will automatically be counted as 2010-11 revenue.

Permanent Fund

On 30 April 2010, the Permanent Fund's net assets were US\$201.9 million. As of 30 April 2010 the estimated expectancies to the Permanent Fund stood at US\$430.7 million. Therefore, the Permanent Fund's net assets and expectancies were US\$632.6 million as of 30 April 2010. The goal is to reach US\$1 billion by 2025.

Bequest Society Update

As of 31 May 2010, there were 7,296 Bequest Society commitments with an expected value of US\$316.5 million. These commitments represent a significant percentage of the expectancies to the Permanent Fund and an increase of 52 new bequests valued at more than US\$1.9 million since April.

FUTURE VISION PILOT OPERATIONS

Foundation Approves District and Global Grants

We are pleased to announce that the Foundation has begun approving district and global grants to be implemented beginning 1 July. Congratulations to Rotary District 3330 for being the first district to receive a district grant. Congratulations to the Rotary Clubs of Solo Kartini, Indonesia (D3400) and Westport, CT, USA (D7980) for receiving the first global grant which will support dengue fever eradication efforts in Indonesia.

District Grant Spending Plans

A number of pilot districts have already submitted 2010-11 district grant applications that have been approved by TRF. Several of these districts (1970, 2650, 3330, and 6560) have kindly agreed to share their district grant spending plans with other pilot districts. These spending plans provide brief information about each of the projects these districts plan to support with their district grant funds, including the name of their participating clubs and the amount allocated to these projects. We hope these documents can serve as a helpful reference to your districts as they select their 2010-11 district grant projects and begin preparing their online district grant application.

TRF PROGRAMS

Humanitarian Grants Updates

Increased Matching Grants Budget

You are all now aware of the significantly increased budget for Matching Grants of \$21.5 Million. It is anticipated that there will be plenty of funding available to support Rotarian's grant requests throughout the Rotary year. As RRFC you may want to reassure your districts that there is no need to submit all applications 1 July. Rotarians will likely receive faster processing if they wait a few months into the Rotary year to submit their application. The Rotary Foundation has increased its resources in order to help combat the significant number of applications that will likely be received in July, but there will still be delays when over 150 applications are submitted each day. Rotarians that are comfortable waiting until November or December to submit their application will experience fewer delays as the volume for submissions during that time is very low. TRF plans on having two competitive grant rounds for Matching Grants, one at the Trustee's October meeting and one at their April meeting. Deadlines for these applications are as follows:

- **1 August** for the October meeting
- **15 December** for the April meeting

Staff has received many questions asking if it is still possible to submit Matching Grant applications that do not request a match from The Rotary Foundation. The answer is: yes. Even though there is a significant budget available, Rotarians are still free to submit applications which do not request a match from TRF.

International Travel for Matching Grants

The Trustees recently permitted international travel as an eligible expense for Rotarian volunteers who are qualified to directly implement a Matching Grant project starting 1 July 2010. Travel should be included in the budget and financing of the Matching Grant application and will have to be booked by the clubs and districts (not through Rotary International Travel Service (RITS)). Eligible items would include travel insurance, vaccines, lodging, coach class plane fares, visas, food, ancillary expenses, etc. The Rotary Foundation will abide by Rotary International's travel ban list for any countries where travel may not be safe. More information will be posted on the website, including an updated application form and an information guide to address anticipated questions. You will be notified when this information is available to Rotarians worldwide. Updated Publications

In light of the changes made this Rotary year to the Matching Grant program the MG application, Guide to Matching Grants, Terms and Conditions document, and various information guides will be updated. The updates will focus on the inclusion of travel as an eligible expense, more information about Rotarian Cooperating organizations and helpful hints to Rotarians on how to more quickly receive their grant funds. We hope to have the English versions available within the month and the translated versions available in the next 6-8 weeks. Please know that Rotarians can still use the "old" application for submission on 1 July 2010. Any information needed for new changes will be requested by staff once the application is received and reviewed.

Chile Recovery Fund

The Rotary Foundation established the Rotary Chile Recovery Fund, which is a temporarily restricted account to receive contributions for longer-term disaster recovery efforts in Chile. The Rotary Chile Recovery Fund established by TRF has received US\$975,443 in cash and DDF donations. TRF is prepared to receive and start processing Matching Grant applications to access these funds starting 1 July 2010. Districts 4320, 4340, 4350, 4360 and their member clubs may partner with a club or district outside of Chile to apply for a Matching Grant. As with all Matching Grants projects, Chile Matching Grants will require Rotary clubs or districts to work together to plan, implement, and complete the project. The Matching Grant partners can pledge DDF and cash contributions and request that they be matched by the Rotary Chile Recovery Fund. All current Matching Grant guidelines and criteria will be the same for these projects including the restrictions regarding construction and renovation. The Rotary Foundation will accept and approve these Matching Grants regardless of World Fund availability until all of the funds in the Rotary Chile Recovery Fund have been committed. Humanitarian Grants Success Story

TWO LEGS MAKE TWO HUNDRED

While attending the Centennial Convention in Chicago, Rotarian Roger White, D7020, attended a workshop on land mines and victims. Roger had a general knowledge of land mines and the resultant problems from them being laid but was very impressed by the work being carried out by Rotary clubs throughout the world to help eradicate the problems. Thus inspired, Roger decided to find out more information and to see what he could do to help. He joined the Rotarians for Mine Action group, helping to run their booth at the Copenhagen convention in the following year. In addition, he decided to see if his club (RC of St. Thomas, in the Virgin Islands) would be interested in exploring the idea of doing an overseas project assisting land mine victims.

In February of 2006, several St. Thomas Rotarians were undertaking a sponsored half marathon on the island of St. John so Roger decided he would join them. It should be mentioned that the route takes the walkers up 1,000 feet and down again. Never having walked this distance before, he began to improve his fitness level and, at the same time, soliciting sponsorships from friends and colleagues throughout the world. Donations came in euros, sterling and dollars and eventually totaled \$5,700. With an early start to avoid the worst of the tropical heat, six Rotarians joined Roger to complete the 13 miles of hilly terrain finishing at a convenient watering hole in Cruz Bay!

Roger's search for an international partnering club was made easy by a fellow club member, Solomon Kabuka - a native of Uganda. After many e-mails and the able assistance of then Governor Tusu and AG Caroline Abija, Roger established a correspondence relationship with the President Abongo Levi of the RC of Lira in the north of Uganda. Lira and its environs had been within the area of the 20 year long attacks by the Lord's Resistance Army. Thousands of villagers throughout the area had been forced to flee from their homes and were living in internal displacement camps. Many had lost limbs due to land mines and there is still a genuine concern that more will be lost when they return to their villages since there has been no mine clearance undertaken. In addition, many young men had been recruited to join the LRA and were now in dire need of rehabilitation and education.

Using the funds raised on his walk and a further donation from his club, Roger obtained a matching grant totaling \$25,000.00 part of which enabled the Lira Rotary club to provide 125 victims with lower limb prostheses and the ability to, once again, be productive members of their societies.



In addition, they received tools and ploughs to be used within their villages to produce food for their families. The grant was also able to provide educational scholarships for ten young abductees to enable them to lead productive adult lives.

By the time the grant was finalized, Roger and Levi had established a great rapport via the internet and it seemed an obvious conclusion to the project for them to meet in person. In September of 2007, Roger and his wife, now DGE Diana of District 7020, spent three weeks in Uganda during which time they were able to meet the limb and scholarship recipients and also to research the feasibility

of future projects to assist with the eradication of the mined areas. When visiting the displacement camps, it became apparent that, while some harvesting was being undertaken, the fact that the camps were intended to be temporary in nature, there had been little effort to establish farming areas. This was further complicated by the land having been given by local farmers to assist the displaced persons and the farmers receiving little or no compensation for not having the use of their own land - in some cases for almost 20 years. The area has been peaceful for the past year and some of the residents had returned to their villages and planted crops. Unfortunately, in early September there was a period of record-breaking rainfall causing sufficient flooding for all the crops to be destroyed. The heart-breaking result was that the villages had now had to return to the camps for food and shelter.

Since 2006, there have been further annual fundraising walks by St. Thomas Rotarians and two more matching grants as well as direct financial support for projects in the war affected area. These have provided further rehabilitation necessities such as replacement prosthesis, tools, seeds, well drilling, mosquito nets, sewing machines and bee keeping equipment and further educational scholarships. This expansion of assistance has been possible as a result of the generous involvement of RC Fredericksberg and District 1470 in Denmark and RC Kirkcudbright in Scotland in joining with RC St. Thomas to assist the Rotarians of Lira to bring relief to the displaced and the injured in their area – real Rotary International at work.

Educational Program Updates

ROTARY PEACE CENTERS

Peace Fellow Plenary Speaker at RI Convention in Montréal

Marios Antoniou, a Cyprus native and recent Rotary Peace Fellow graduate from the University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill, will speak about his experience as a Rotary Peace Fellow at the upcoming RI Convention in Montréal. Marios specializes in peace building within formal and non-formal education systems and has carried out collaborative research in this area with the European Youth Centre in Budapest and the Department of Education at the University of Cyprus. Rotarians are invited to listen to Marios speak during the second Plenary Session Monday, 21 June 2010 from 9:30-11:45.

Class IX ICU Peace Fellows begin their Academic Journey

Ten new Rotary Peace Fellows will travel to Tokyo, Japan this summer to participate in an intensive Japanese language program at International Christian University; the program runs for

the 6 weeks prior to the start of their MA program in September. In addition to language courses, fellows will engage in cultural education lessons to facilitate their adaptation to Japanese society.

Peacebuilder Districts

While districts are not required to contribute funds to the Rotary Peace Centers, all districts are encouraged to allocate some amount of their District Designated Funds (DDF) in support of the peace fellowships. Districts that allocate US\$25,000 per year or US\$50,000 every two years from their DDF to support a Rotary Peace Fellow are known as Peacebuilder Districts and will be recognized appropriately.

More than ever the Rotary Peace Fellowship program needs your help. Please consider allocating your unused DDF towards renewing or establishing a new Peacebuilder District commitment.

AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Annual Call for Host Counselors

Host counselor request forms have been sent to all districts with inbound scholars. District representatives should be reminded that all inbound scholars must be assigned a host counselor. Additionally, it is imperative that host counselors understand that they must maintain regular contact with their scholars during assignment periods.

Applications, Communications and Record Keeping

In the interest of more efficient record keeping and in order to speed up the study institution assignment process, districts are requested to submit all 2011-12 Ambassadorial Scholarship applications electronically when possible. This means that applications can be scanned and e-mailed or sent to TRF by fax. Applications are due to TRF by 1 October 2010. Additionally,

districts are asked to encourage both their inbound and outbound 2010-11 scholars to submit all pre-departure documents and reports to their respective coordinators via fax or e-mail.

GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE

TRF Programs Division Focused on Non-Pilot Districts

For the six GSE Department staff at the RI Secretariat, the 100 Future Vision pilot districts are only a faint “blip” on their radar screens as staff gears up for what will be a busy three years for the most widely used program of TRF. Due to the fact that the Trustees agreed to restore the availability of World Fund to help partially finance GSE teams for all non-pilot districts again in Rotary Year 2012-13, the general secretary wants TRF to be fully staffed. TRF has recently hired two new Group Study Exchange Coordinators to fill vacant positions in the department so as to provide prompt and courteous service to the 429 districts not in the Future Vision pilot. TRF is committed to helping ensure that every outbound GSE team receives the hosting district’s proposed team travel itinerary at least two months in advance so that the outbound team can provide feedback to its host district Rotarians long before it arrives. The GSE Department staff will draw upon their full menu of foreign language skills, which now includes Spanish, Portuguese, French, Urdu and Japanese, as they work to support the 1,105 GSE teams anticipated to travel abroad over the next three years. Non-pilot districts participating in GSE -- as well as the other TRF programs -- should experience no lapse in service in the years leading up to global rollout of the new Future Vision grants model.

GSE Reimbursements

As all 2009-10 GSE teams return home from their exchanges, and the Rotary Year comes to a close, districts are reminded that GSE reimbursements were due to TRF no later 16 June 2010.

Please also be sure to submit the appropriate Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) Information Form, so that the payment can be expedited. All GSE reimbursements are now made via direct deposit, and please complete the entire form if you are requesting an international payment, listing an intermediary or corresponding bank if necessary.

Should your district have any questions about how to complete the EFT Form or the exact information that is required, please contact your GSE coordinator at the GSE department.

GSE Final Reports and Evaluation Forms

GSE teams are also reminded that Final Reports and Evaluations Forms are due two months after completion of the GSE exchange. Teams are also free to submit more free-form group reports in place of the Final Report Form and are highly encouraged to submit digital pictures from their exchange. Pictures from vocational visits are particularly encouraged. If your district’s team has any unique stories from their exchange, please share this information with your coordinator in the GSE department. These items may be used to promote the GSE program in future publications such as the Rotarian Magazine.

Additionally, any team which has maintained an online blog or travel journal during their exchange is asked to submit a link to this site along with the Final Reports.

Reports are mandatory and must be submitted by each participant for the exchange. The GSE department is tracking submission of Final Reports and districts with outstanding reporting for both the 2008-09 and 2009-10 program years will be placed on probation for the 2010-11 program year. If your district is unsure as to the status of its reporting, please contact the GSE department.

2010-11 GSE Changes
